

Government appeals to protesters near the Police Headquarters to disperse as soon as possible

A government spokesperson said today (June 27) that the Government respects the public's right to peaceful assembly. However, it is unacceptable for some protesters to block the roads and surround the Police Headquarters, seriously affecting the work of the Police and causing inconvenience to other members of the public. The spokesperson appeals to the protesters to disperse as soon as possible, and be considerate in expressing their views.

Murder in Central

Police yesterday (June 26) reclassified a person collapsed case in Central that occurred on June 16 as murder.

At about 9.50pm on June 16, Police received a report that a man collapsed on Man Kwong Street. Police officers sped to the scene and found the 63-year-old man lying unconsciously on the ground. He was rushed to Queen Mary Hospital in unconscious state and was certified dead at 9.04am on June 18.

Post-mortem examinations revealed that the 63-year-old man sustained a fatal injury on his head.

Regional Crime Unit of Hong Kong Island took over the case. A 26-year-old man in suspected connection with the case was arrested for murder in Tuen Mun District yesterday. Initial investigation showed that the deceased had a dispute with the 26-year-old man and was suspected to be pushed to the ground.

Active investigation by the Regional Crime Unit of Hong Kong Island is underway.

Police reiterate that if any person obtains personal data by unlawful means or discloses any personal data without data user's consent, he/she may have committed a criminal offence.

Police once again strongly condemn such behaviour. Active investigation by Cyber Security and Technology Crime Bureau is underway.
