# London ETO promotes Hong Kong films at the Chinese Visual Festival 2019 (with photos)

It also gives me great pleasure to welcome these acclaimed movie makers from Hong Kong to London to talk about their latest films."

"Despite the fact that Hong Kong is only a small city with a population of about seven million, it is one of the world's largest film production bases. Blessed with a wealth of seasoned and new talents, Hong Kong's film industry continues to thrive."

"And the Hong Kong Government is committed to supporting the industry. The Chief Executive, in her 2018 Policy Address, announced that the government would inject another HK\$1 billion into the Film Development Fund. The Government strives to make optimal use of the funding to nurture local talent, enhance local production, expand markets and build audience.", Ms To added.

As well as supporting the CVF, the London ETO is supporting a retrospective of the career of Hong Kong director Angie Chen at the HOME arts centre in Manchester between May 12 and 14, which will screen "I've Got the Blues" (2017), "My Name Ain't Suzie" (1985) and "This Darling Life" (2008). The first two screenings will include a post-screening audience Q&A session with Angie Chen.

## Hong Kong animations showcased in Germany (with photo)
