<u>Water quality at Clear Water Bay First</u> <u>Beach and Clear Water Bay Second Beach</u> <u>improves</u>

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department announced today (May 2) that the Environmental Protection Department has classified the water quality at Clear Water Bay First Beach and Clear Water Bay Second Beach in Sai Kung District as Grade 2, which means the water quality has improved and the beaches are suitable for swimming. Red flags were hoisted at these beaches earlier due to the water quality being classified as Grade 4 and unsuitable for swimming.

However, the red flags at the beach are still hoisted due to big waves. Beach-goers are advised not to swim at these beaches.

<u>Public forums on proposals for</u> <u>enhancing animal welfare</u>

The Government, through amending the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance (Cap. 169), proposes to extend the existing legislation which prohibits and penalises acts of cruelty to animals to include taking positive actions on looking after animals well. A three-month public consultation has been launched. To gauge the views of members of the public, the Government will hold four public forums.
