

## [Progressive increase of statutory holidays from this year](#)

Statutory holidays under the Employment Ordinance will be increased progressively during 2022 to 2030 in accordance with the Employment (Amendment) Ordinance 2021. The newly added statutory holiday from this year onwards is the Birthday of the Buddha.

A spokesman for the Labour Department (LD) said, "All employees covered by the Employment Ordinance, irrespective of their hours of work and length of service, are entitled to statutory holidays. An employee is further eligible for holiday pay if he/she has been employed under a continuous contract (i.e. being employed continuously by the same employer for four weeks or more, with at least 18 hours worked in each week) for not less than three months before a statutory holiday."

Statutory holidays will be increased progressively to 17 days. The other additional statutory holidays in sequence will be the first weekday after Christmas Day (from 2024), Easter Monday (from 2026), Good Friday (from 2028), and the day following Good Friday (from 2030).

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## Government enforces “restriction-testing declaration” and compulsory testing notice in respect of specified “restricted area” in Tin Shui Wai (with photo)

â€‹The Government yesterday (December 31, 2021) exercised the power under the Prevention and Control of Disease (Compulsory Testing for Certain Persons) Regulation (Cap. 599J) to make a "restriction-testing declaration" effective from 7pm yesterday, under which people (hereafter referred to as "persons subject to compulsory testing") within the specified "restricted area" in Tin Shui Wai (i.e. Block 2, Grandeur Terrace, No. 88 Tin Shui Road, Tin Shui Wai, New Territories, Hong Kong.) were required to stay in their premises and undergo compulsory testing. Persons subject to compulsory testing are required to stay in their premises until all such persons identified in the "restricted area" have undergone testing and the test results are mostly ascertained. In addition, the Government had issued a compulsory testing notice yesterday to any person who had been present at the building for more than two hours from December 17 to December 31, 2021, to undergo compulsory testing on or before January 2, 2022 even if they were not present in the "restricted area" at the time when the declaration took effect. The Government finished the compulsory testing exercise at around 7am today (January 1, 2022) and is now carrying out enforcement actions in the "restricted area" to verify that all people in the "restricted area" have undergone compulsory testing. The Government will further announce the revocation time of the declaration.

Starting from around 7am today, persons in the "restricted area" in Tin Shui Wai who have undergone testing and are able to present SMS notifications with negative test results or wear wristbands as proof of having undergone testing may leave the "restricted area" through the designated exit after providing personal information to a prescribed officer.

The Government set up temporary specimen collection stations in the "restricted area" yesterday and requested persons subject to compulsory testing to collect combined nasal and throat swab samples at the stations to undergo a COVID-19 virus test before 1am today. As at 1am today, around 1 122 persons had undergone testing. No confirmed case was found.

Moreover, the Government also assigned staff to visit around 370 households, among which 32 households did not answer the door. The Government will take measures to follow up.

The Government also understands that some residents already underwent testing at some other collection stations or by other means. Therefore, persons in the "restricted area" who have undergone testing from December 29 to December 31, 2021, and are able to provide the SMS notification through mobile phone or related certification containing the test results, may leave the "restricted area" through the designated exit.

The Government reiterates that enforcement actions will be taken seriously. Any person who fails to present an SMS notification with a test result or wear a wristband as proof of having undergone testing breaches the compulsory testing notice and may be liable to a fine of \$5,000. The person will also be issued with a compulsory testing order, requiring him/her to undergo testing within a specified time frame. Failure to comply with the compulsory testing order or the "restriction-testing declaration" is an offence and the offender may be liable to a fine of level 4 (\$25,000) and imprisonment for six months.
