

CHP investigates 443 confirmed and 50 asymptomatic additional SARS-CoV-2 virus cases with 1 126 pending cases status

The Centre for Health Protection (CHP) of the Department of Health (DH) today (February 15) announced the latest epidemic situation of COVID-19. As of 0.00am, February 15, the CHP was investigating 443 additional confirmed cases, 50 additional asymptomatic cases and 1 126 cases with pending case status in the past 24 hours (i.e. there were 1 619 additional cases that tested positive for the SARS-CoV-2 virus in those 24 hours). Hong Kong has recorded a total of 26 670 cases that tested positive for the SARS-CoV-2 virus so far.

The newly reported cases are all locally acquired cases. The CHP is continuing with epidemiological investigation on the cases.

As at 4pm today, a total of 10 854 cases that tested positive for the SARS-CoV-2 virus have been reported in the past 14 days (February 1 to 14), including 10 733 locally acquired cases and 121 imported cases. In addition, among the earlier cases reported, there were cases (including pending cases) changed to confirmed, asymptomatic or re-positive cases. As at yesterday (February 14), the total number of confirmed cases were 18 656, while the figures for asymptomatic cases, re-positive cases, pending/unknown cases recorded since January 1 were 2 032, 10 and 4 353 respectively.

According to the testing and quarantine arrangements for cases with mutant strains, persons who resided or worked within the same building as the residence of relevant cases will be subject to compulsory testing on specified dates in accordance with the announcement by the DH according to risk assessment (see the details of the buildings and dates of testing at www.coronavirus.gov.hk/pdf/CTN_Specified_premises_and_Dates_of_Testing.pdf). The CHP strongly reminded members of the public to strictly follow the compulsory testing requirements and undergo the multiple tests on time as required. The compulsory testing requirement applies to those who have completed a COVID-19 vaccination course as well. The Government will seriously verify whether they had complied with the testing notices. The Government reiterates that the aim of issuing a compulsory testing notice is to stop the spread of COVID-19 in the community as soon as possible to protect overall public health and safety.

The spokesman for the CHP stressed that the local situation of COVID-19 infection became severe recently and there is a continuous increase in the number of cases involving mutant strains that carry higher

transmissibility. With the higher transmissibility and risk of infection of the Omicron mutant strain, the CHP strongly appeals to the community to continue to comply with the social distancing measures, avoid going out and to refrain from participating in unnecessary or crowded activities or gatherings (particularly religious or cross-family activities and gatherings). This would lower the risk of infection and prevent the virus from spreading in the community.
