

Grading of beach water quality released

The Environmental Protection Department (EPD) today (November 8) released the latest grading of water quality for eight gazetted beaches that are open for swimming. Other beaches have been closed to swimmers from November 1 for the winter season.

Six beaches were rated as Good (Grade 1) and two as Fair (Grade 2).

Grade 1 beaches are:

Big Wave Bay Beach	Golden Beach
Clear Water Bay Second Beach	Repulse Bay Beach
Deep Water Bay Beach	Stanley Main Beach

Grade 2 beaches are:

Silver Mine Bay Beach	Silverstrand Beach
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Compared with the grading released last week, Silverstrand Beach has been changed from Grade 1 to Grade 2.

"The changes are generally within the normal range of fluctuation of the bacteriological water quality of the beaches," an EPD spokesman said.

Under the present grading system, beaches are classified into four grades, namely Good (Grade 1), Fair (Grade 2), Poor (Grade 3) and Very Poor (Grade 4), according to the level of E. coli in the water. Grades are calculated on the basis of the geometric mean of the E. coli counts on the five most recent sampling occasions.

While the ratings represent the general water quality at the beaches, the EPD spokesman reminded members of the public that water quality could be temporarily affected during and after periods of heavy rain. Bathers should avoid swimming at beaches for up to three days after a storm or heavy rainfall.
