Hong Kong Customs seizes suspected dangerous drugs and suspected phenacetin (with photo)

Hong Kong Customs yesterday (December 1) in Sham Shui Po seized about 1 kilogram of suspected crack cocaine, about 500 grams of suspected cocaine and about 900g of suspected phenacetin (a Part 1 poison), with an estimated market value of about \$3.8 million.

During an anti-narcotics operation conducted in Sham Shui Po last night, Customs officers intercepted a 20-year-old man and found about 200g of suspected crack cocaine inside a plastic bag carried by him. He was then arrested.

After follow-up investigation, Customs officers escorted the arrested man to a residential premises in the district where about 800g of suspected crack cocaine, about 500g of suspected cocaine, about 900g of suspected phenacetin as well as a batch of drug manufacturing and packaging paraphernalia were further seized. Another 23-year-old man suspected to be involved in the case was arrested.

An investigation is ongoing.

Under the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, trafficking in a dangerous drug is a serious offence. The maximum penalty upon conviction is a fine of \$5 million and life imprisonment.

Under the Pharmacy and Poisons Ordinance, any person who possesses any poison included in Part 1 of the Poisons List other than in accordance with provisions commits an offence. The maximum penalty upon conviction is a fine of \$100,000 and imprisonment for two years.
