## Moon watching tips for Mid-Autumn Festival 2021

The Mid-Autumn Festival this year falls on September 21 (Tuesday) and the full moon (Note) will occur that morning. If the weather permits, a bright and clear moon will be observable at night during the Mid-Autumn Festival period.

To facilitate moon watching by the public, the times of moonrise, transit, moonset and full moon during the Mid-Autumn Festival period are listed in the table below. At transit, the Moon passes the local meridian due south and its elevation is the highest of the night.

September 20 (Monday) — the eve of the Mid-Autumn Festival	
Moonrise	6.13pm
Transit (Elevation 61 degrees)	0.10am (next morning)
Moonset	6.11am (next morning)
September 21 (Tuesday) — the Mid-Autumn Festival	
Full Moon (The Moon is below the horizon of Hong Kong at this moment)	7.55am
Moonrise	6.47pm
Transit (Elevation 66 degrees)	0.54am (next morning)
Moonset	7.05am (next morning)
September 22 (Wednesday) — the day following the Mid-Autumn Festival	
Moonrise	7.20pm
Transit (Elevation 72 degrees)	1.36am (next morning)
Moonset	7.56am (next morning)

Note: At full moon, the Moon as seen from Earth is completely illuminated with the Moon and the Sun located on the opposite sides of Earth.
