## More than half a million pupils are now crammed into supersize classrooms

Labour<br>today publishes analysis of overcrowding in English primary schools with more than half a million pupils being taught in super-size classes. It reveals:<br>- 542,679 children are now in<br>super-size classes in primary school, as class-sizes continue to rise<br>- $\quad 39,000$ primary pupils are in<br>classes of over 36 pupils and 16,571 are now in class sizes of at least 40<br>- The mounting pressure on school<br>places is now starting to hit secondary schools, with figures showing an increase in the number of pupils in very large classes in the last year<br>- The South East and North West are<br>the two worst hit areas with latest figures showing over 90,000 primary school<br>pupils in classes over 30<br>- The number of infant school<br>children (between the age of 5 and 7 years) in classes over 30 has almost trebled since 2010<br>\section*{Commenting}<br>on the figures, Shadow Schools Minister, Mike Kane, said:<br>"These<br>figures expose seven years of Tory failure in our schools. The number of pupils<br>being taught in super-sized classes is skyrocketing while schools face the first real terms cuts to their budgets in a generation.<br>"This<br>situation is unsustainable. If the Tories wanted to give every child the education they deserve they would ensure that children were not crammed into super-sized classes.<br>"A Labour<br>Government would ensure that schools are built where they are needed, and cap class sizes at 30 for all primary school pupils."
