The event will be held at the artificial turf pitch of Tsing Yi Northeast Park from 9am to 12.30pm. Members of the public can play water games with different features, such as a fun maze, inflatable fun roller, and giant inflatable pool, on this summer day. The event is conducted in three sessions: 9am to 10am, 10.15am to 11.15am, and 11.30am to 12.30pm. Members of the public who are interested can collect admission tickets in person at the Kwai Tsing District Leisure Services Office or the Tsing Yi Northeast Park Office starting from 8.30am on June 20. Each person is entitled to a maximum of four tickets on a first-come, first-served basis. A small number of tickets will be reserved for walk-in participants on the event day on a first-come, first-served basis.

In addition, a range of fun-filled interactive games will be set up from 9am to 1pm at the outdoor basketball court and piazza. The public of all ages are welcome to join. Admission is free. CreateHK restructured as Cultural and Creative Industries Development Agency

Create Hong Kong (CreateHK) of the Culture, Sports and Tourism Bureau (CSTB) is restructured as the Cultural and Creative Industries Development Agency (CCIDA) with effect from today (June 14), to proactively promote the development of arts, culture and creative sectors as industries under the industry-oriented principle of implementing Hong Kong's positioning as an East-meets-West centre for international cultural exchange under the National 14th Five-Year Plan.

The Secretary for Culture, Sports and Tourism, Mr Kevin Yeung, said, "It was announced in 'The Chief Executive's 2023 Policy Address' that the Government would take the initiative to restructure CreateHK as the CCIDA, which will play a more proactive and positive role in enhancing its support for the development of the arts, culture and creative sectors."

"The CCIDA will set up new dedicated teams to proactively identify external opportunities for relevant industries and lead them to arrange delegations to various showcases worldwide to export Hong Kong's cultural and creative industries, foster business opportunities and enhance Hong Kong's international status. It will continue to identify suitable and promising projects in relevant sectors to promote the application of cross-sectoral and cross-genre content, and strengthen the support for the industries to enable their content distribution. The CCIDA will further facilitate the creation and production of cultural intellectual property (IP), enable cultural IP transactions, and explore business and commercialisation opportunities to enhance economic benefits," Mr Yeung added.

CreateHK was set up in June 2009 as an office dedicated to promoting the development of creative industries in Hong Kong. After the restructuring, the CCIDA will provide one-stop services and support to cultural and creative industries with a mission to foster a conducive environment in Hong Kong to facilitate the development of arts, culture and creative sectors as industries.

Appointments to Hong Kong Trade Development Council

United Nations Sanctions (Somalia) Regulation 2019 (Amendment) Regulation 2024 gazetted

The Government today (June 14) gazetted the United Nations Sanctions (Somalia) Regulation 2019 (Amendment) Regulation 2024, which came into operation today.

"The Amendment Regulation amends the United Nations Sanctions (Somalia)

Regulation 2019 to give effect to certain decisions on sanctions in the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) Resolutions 2713 and 2714 in respect of Somalia," a Government spokesman said.

The amendments mainly relate to prohibition against the supply, sale, transfer or carriage of weapons, ammunition or military equipment to Somalia or to certain persons; prohibition against the provision of technical assistance or training or financial or other assistance to certain persons; and certain exemption arrangements in respect of arms embargo, improvised explosive devices (IED) components ban and provision of IED technology.

The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Government has all along been implementing fully the sanctions imposed by the UNSC. The Amendment Regulation aims to give effect to the instructions by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for fulfilling the international obligations of the People's Republic of China as a Member State of the United Nations.
