Education and youth participation for more inclusive and tolerant cities

However, FRA's <u>Fundamental Rights Survey</u> also shows that an overwhelming part of people generally consider human rights key for making fairer societies. Local authorities are best placed to develop innovative solutions to tackle intolerance and discriminatory attitudes. By investing more in education and working with people, in particular the youth, local authorities can greatly contribute in building more inclusive and tolerant societies. Over two days, over 200 participants from the ECCAR cities network and international, European and national stakeholders shared experiences and promising practices. They looked at how education, engaging young people and communication can contribute to fight against racism and discrimination locally.

ESMA CONSULTS ON SUPERVISORY FEES FOR DATA REPORTING SERVICES PROVIDERS

The European Securities and Markets Authority, the EU's securities markets regulator, today launches a <u>public consultation</u> on supervisory fees for data reporting services providers (DRSPs) to be supervised by ESMA starting in 2022.

Following the ESAs Review, the authorisation and supervision of data reporting services providers (DRSP) will be transferred from national competent authorities to ESMA starting January 2022.

The consultation aims to gather stakeholder views on fees for DRSPs that will be supervised by ESMA. The proposed fee framework for DRSPs draws on the existing fee frameworks for Trade Repositories and Securitisation Repositories which set out application as well as annual supervisory fees.

ESMA is proposing both application and authorisation fees, as well as an annual supervisory fee for DRSPs. It has also proposed a timeline for the payment of the fees.

Next steps

The closing date for responses is 4 January 2021. ESMA will consider the responses to this consultation in providing technical advice to the Commission and aims to publish its final report in Q1 2021.

ESMA CONSULTS ON DEROGATION CRITERIA FOR DATA REPORTING SERVICES PROVIDERS

The European Securities and Markets Authority, the EU's securities markets regulator, today launches a <u>public consultation</u> on criteria to identify Authorised Reporting Mechanisms (ARMs) and Approved Publications Arrangements

(APAs) subject to authorisation and supervision by a competent authority of a EU Member States from January 2022.

Following the ESAs' Review, authorisation and supervision of data reporting services providers (DRSP) will move from competent authorities to ESMA. The revised regulation envisages that certain ARMs and APAs may be exempted from direct EU supervision due to their limited relevance for the internal market.


The aim of this consultation is to provide technical advice to the European Commission on such derogation criteria, in particular on:

- how to determine if the APA or ARM services are provided to investment firms authorised in one Member State;
- how to calculate the number of trade reports or transactions;
- how to determine whether the ARM or APA is part of a group of financial market participants operating cross-border; as well as other aspects relevant for the determination whether the ARM or APA has a limited relevance for the internal market.

Next steps

The consultation closes on 4 January 2021. ESMA will consider the feedback received from stakeholders in providing the technical advice to the Commission, and aims to publish its final report in Q1 2021.

Protecting consumers

On Wednesday MEPs are expected to call for measures to create <u>a more</u> <u>sustainable single market</u> by strengthening consumers' "right to repair," preventing practices that intentionally shorten the lifespan of products and promoting a culture of reuse.

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They will also call for greater efforts to <u>improve product safety and protect</u> consumers at EU level.

MEPs will vote on <u>new rules</u> to allow groups of consumers to take collective legal action at national and EU level. Results will be announced on Wednesday.

Industrial strategy

MEPs will debate the EU's industrial strategy on Monday and are set to adopt a resolution on TWednesday, calling for a revision to the European Commission's proposal to reflect the measures needed to recover from the impact of the coronavirus pandemic, while contributing to the EU's green and digital goals.

Media freedom

The state of media freedom in the EU will discussed on Monday, with MEPs focusing on the protection of journalists, political interference,

disinformation and the role of platforms. On Wednesday, MEPs will discuss Hungarian interference in the media in Slovenia and North Macedonia.

Digitalisation of justice

Parliament is set to approve new rules on Tuesday to make <u>access to justice</u> <u>faster</u>, <u>cheaper and more user-friendly</u> for EU citizens and businesses through new digital solutions.

Council summit priorities

Ahead of the Council summit on 10-11 December MEPs are expected to raise issues ranging from the <u>EU's long-term budget</u> and <u>rule of law</u> to Covid-19 testing and vaccines, EU climate targets and fighting terrorism in a debate with Commission President Ursula von der Leyen on Wednesday.
